


Course Syllabus

Stephen Girard: Finding a Forgotten Founding Father

Course Goal

This course will introduce you to a pivotally important, yet little-known, figure in early American history who left an indelible mark on Philadelphia: Stephen Girard. By studying a posthumous portrait of Girard held in the Rosenbach's collection, reading early biographies of Girard, and discussing the merchant and banker's life and impact, students

will situate Girard in the context of Revolutionary and early national Philadelphia, paying special attention to issues of gender, family, race/enslavement, and emerging American commercial capitalism.

Following these initial studies, students will take a deep dive into the archival and museum collections of Girard College to come face-to-face with early Philadelphian history. This course provides a unique opportunity not only to learn about an important Philadelphian, but to become immersed in rare books, manuscripts, archival material, and artifacts from Girard's life, including clothing, furniture, and other materials.

Course Schedule

Session 1. Portrait of a Citizen: Stephen Girard, in Myth & Memory

The first course session will be held at the Rosenbach Museum & Library, where students will look closely at the portrait of Stephen Girard hanging in the historic house before viewing historical documentation related to the artwork. Following a presentation outlining Girard's life and legacy, the class will engage in a discussion in the Rosenbach's dining room about how Girard has been remembered through history. Finally, the class will discuss plans for our field trip to Girard College for the next class session.

Session 2. The Long Shadow of Stephen Girard: Investigating Philanthropy, Race, Gender, and Civil Rights Through the Material Culture at Girard College

The second session of the course brings us to the Girard College Historical Collection in monumental Founder's Hall at Girard College. During this session, Brenna Holland will share her research about Girard, his family, and his larger social and economic network. Then, Kathy Haas will lead a hands-on tour of the remarkable rare books, manuscripts, and museum objects preserved at the college, bringing participants as close to Girard as is possible by means of the surviving artifacts of his life.

Instructors

Katherine Haas is Director of Historical Resources at Girard College, where she manages museum, archival, and library resources documenting the life and legacy of Stephen Girard. She recently completed a reinstallation of the Founder's Hall galleries. Haas formerly served as Associate Curator at the Rosenbach.

Dr. Brenna Holland wrote her Ph.D. dissertation at Temple University on the subject of Stephen Girard and is currently completing a book project focused on merchant's family life. She works as Assistant Director of Library & Museum Programs at the American Philosophical Society.

Dr. Alexander Lawrence Ames is Director of Outreach & Engagement at the Rosenbach Museum & Library. He is completing a book manuscript titled *Ships of Reason: The Atlantic Enlightenment of Stephen Girard, Mariner, Merchant, Banker, & Philanthropist of the Early American Republic.*
